Greetings from your new Board of Trustees!

Every year we hope to keep you informed of our work on behalf of our Congregation, but truthfully, our communication can be spotty. At our recent retreat, we resolved to add to the end of each agenda the question: What do we need the Congregation to know?

Hopefully this little change will improve our communications. In addition, we plan to keep having Quarterly Town Hall Meetings (October, January, March and May – specific dates TBA), re-activate our Board Listening Ear periodically, and to produce a Board Splinters column once a month. In addition, we are also your fellow congregants and friends. You can easily reach out to us with questions, answers or concerns whenever needed. We are: Kate Thorpe (President), Tim Wolcott (President Elect), Gay Canough (Treasurer), Jenne Micale (Clerk), Ferd Haverly, Shawn Steketee, Carrie Greenstrom, Bob Neigh (Trustees), Dylan Cooke (DFM) and Douglas Taylor (Minister).

This month, the Board would like to share some updates with you on some ongoing issues you may be wondering about.

Acoustic Tiles – for sound abatement in Social Hall and Café- will be installed by Kline (the contractors that did our renovations) in early October at the latest and possibly sooner. The cost for this is covered by funds retained in our Capital Campaign line. They also plan to help fix the issue with our kitchen hood fan sometime after that.

Ground Source Heat Pump (GSHP) – You may have noticed a pipe overflowing water across our back parking lot. The system clogs with iron-loving bacteria, but otherwise works fine to heat and cool our building. The overflow happens when the system is being used. Dailey, the company that installed the system, has been and continues to work with us to solve this problem (even though we are now out of the warranty phase). The Board will be calling for a GSHP Taskforce (to include, among others, Wes Ernsberger and Ed Ware) to continue to work on solving this problem. Please reach out if you are interested in serving here.

Parking Lot – Madeline Cotts has been in contact with Guthrie regarding other issues affecting our back parking lot. In that email, she thanked them for patching the holes in our driveway (which they took responsibility for because our drive continues to be accessed by hospital employees). In addition, Madeline noted that their Phase 1 plan for addressing the frequent flooding of the 3 newcomer spaces had not resolved that issue and that the more extensive Phase 2 plan will need to be implemented. They will be meeting to put that plan into motion.

Stewardship- The Board would like the congregation to be aware that Becca Boeger is stepping down from chairing Stewardship this year. Thank you, Becca, for your service! Although the Stewardship Campaign does not launch until the spring, we would very much like to get a chair and a team into place this fall. Please let us know if you would like to serve in any capacity on this vital committee.

Long Range Planning: The time has come to convene a new Long Range Planning group. Our last plan, written in 2014 and updated in 2020, has brought us a long way. Now is a good time to evaluate where we want to go from here. This is an exciting project that will eventually involve the input of every congregant. UUCB is a Welcoming Congregation Welcoming Congregation is a term for congregations that have voted to affirm, welcome and support gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people and support LGBTQ+ people, including those whose gender identities are genderfluid and non-binary. This concept came about because people of non-majority sexual identity often feel unsafe in religious organizations, feeling that they must stay "in the closet" or feeling subtly excluded.

Adult Choir is Seeking New Members


There is nothing more uplifting than being part of a vocal community, and the choir's contribution is a vital part of our Sunday worship together.

September's Special Collection (Ingathering Service on 9/8): CARES

CARES Advocates for Families, Inc (Community Advocates Restoring Educational Standards) helps students and families of color in the Binghamton school district disrupt the racialized and class based social injustices, promote equity along the lines of race and class and promote restorative justice in communities and within the Binghamton City School District.

To execute our mission, CARES operates using a community organizer toolset, namely relational organizing. CARES has successfully implemented several programs in the Binghamton City school district, including the Parent Mentor Program, in which a parent is present in a classroom to help mitigate referrals and suspensions for students of color. CARES provides advocates to accompany families attending disciplinary meetings and hearings. CARES provides training for Parent Advocates throughout the year around transformative justice, trauma-informed care, and creating social capital within the Binghamton City school district for parents who could otherwise be racially excluded. The annual CARES Backpack Giveaway has supplied thousands of children with a free backpack and school supplies
