First Sundays at UUCB

On the first Sunday of each month, our multigenerational worship service offers innovation in the Sunday Service experience. Designed to increase opportunities for connection and explore many different ways to tap into our intellectual, creative and spiritual depths, we gather for a shorter service in the Sanctuary and then spread out for different workshops. The hardest part is often deciding which experience to choose!

1st Sunday Workshops for March 2nd

"What is Your Favorite Story from UU History?" with Rev. Taylor in the Chapel. Join Douglas Taylor in the chapel to hear a few of his favorite stories from our Unitarian Universalist history and perhaps share your own favorite story as well.

"Faith in Action: Making Spring Wreaths for Nursing Home Residents" with Julie Boyd in the Social Hall. All ages are invited to make spring wreaths to brighten the doors of our neighbors in the Susquehanna Nursing Home.

"Pagan Ritual: An Order of Service" with DJ Goldenberg, 3rd Degree Witch, in the Rainbow **Room**. One objective of any ritual is to do something the same way every time. Find a format that works for you and go for it. This workshop will provide the knowledge you need for ONE way of performing rituals. DJ was taught primarily within an eclectic, Alexandrian system of Wiccan; but she has pulled many aspects of her rituals from experiences and other teachings, expanding it from just being Alexandrian. She is looking forward to facilitating rituals at UUCB; and this workshop may be used as a primer for those rituals, as well as a resource you can use to help you create your own ritual structure. There will be plenty of time for questions. Please feel free to bring questions on anything pagan or pagan adjacent.



SUMMARY

Southern Door Community Land Trust (SDCLT), founded in 2019, is the only Community Land Trust in our area, and only community-led effort to develop deeply affordable housing that will be affordable in perpetuity. SDCLT centers marginalized communities using a racial and social justice lens for BIPOC and vulnerable communities.

Funds secured for their 6-unit Apartment Building are **reimbursement based** (meaning they have to have money to spend first). We aim to raise \$6,000 at UUCB, leverage that with other local churches, to provide SDCLT with no-strings attached funds to get their project started!

KEY FACTS

PERMANENTLY AFFORDABLE IN PERPETUITY

Community Land Trusts fill a gap in the housing continuum by creating deeply affordable housing.

FUNDING HURDLES

A) Government grants are often reimbursement models, meaning non-profits need to have money to spend first to be able to submit receipts for reimbursement.

B) Community Land Trusts do not turn a profit, therefore should not take on debt early in their formation.


