Minneapolis Call to Action 2026

This January 2026, I responded to a call from colleagues in Minneapolis to come participate in a gathering of solidarity and resistance against ICE. MARCH (Multifaith Anti-Racism, Change, & Healing) has several Unitarian Universalists in their organizing team and they reached out with this call. I was in MN from Wednesday evening through Saturday morning (Jan 21-24.) I participated in 2 training, 3 community dinners, 4 actions, and several worship gatherings.

I offer particular gratitude to Rev. James Galasinski of UU Canton who was my travel companion and reflection partner throughout the trip. I am grateful to Rev. Oscar Sinclair who was a youth here at UUCB many years back and is now a minister on the ground in MN serving Unity Unitarian Church in St. Paul. I am deeply grateful to our home hospitality hosts Chris and Sarah Greene who opened their home and hearts to us. You may know Chris and Sarah as Carrie Greenstrom's parents!

During my time in Minneapolis, I participated in four different actions. On Thursday, I joined with other clergy to patrol a section of downtown where ICE regularly showed up. We traveled in pairs and wore visible clergy apparel (I wore my yellow stole).

Friday morning I went to the airport to witness and support a protest against Delta Airlines for allowing ICE to fly their immigrant detainees out of the state to detention centers. 100 local interfaith clergy were attested. (Oscar Sinclair was one of them!) They were all released later that day; but the news outlets picked up the story and amplified the message.

I then participated in a 'sing-in' with songs and prayers at the Target store next to their headquarters for their practice of allowing ICE to use Theo parking lots (and several other reasons, but that was primary.)

From there I made my way with a group of colleagues to meet up with the huge march. I was with them for several blocks leading up to the rally at the arena. My group did not attend the rally as we did not all have tickets. We decided to instead stay outside and bless people as they finished the march.

Thank you for all the support and companionship you've shared with me this week. Our presence here has been very appreciated. My work was to show up and witness; and then to bring back the learnings and the message to help activate our community back home. I look forward to what we will do next!

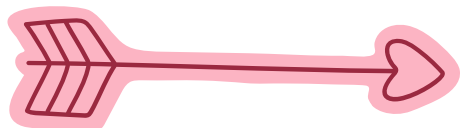

Housing Focus Updates

Tuesday Night Homeless Outreach conducted by local community organizers continues to see many people in need each week. The need is amplified by the sub-zero temperatures. Some organizers have gone out on extra nights with hot drinks, hand warmers, and emergency blankets, even taking them down to encampments on the riverbank. The team runs out of gloves almost every week and last Tuesday they were handing out socks as hand coverings, until they also ran out of socks.

UUCB Giving Box collects supplies for this outreach. They are currently running low on many of the supplies and appreciate any help that can be offered. UUCB members & staff participated in the first two meetings of the Coalition of Congregations in Binghamton (CCB), initiated by Christ Episcopal Church. This interfaith group is in its infancy stage, working on coalition building, meeting one another, and getting to know how the various congregations serve the unhoused community. As a direct result of coalition building, Trinity Memorial Episcopal Church made a donation of \$500 to benefit the bus pass program. Half of the bus passes purchased will be given to Family Enrichment and the other half will be distributed through Street Outreach.

The "Friends In Need Blessing Box" has been installed in front of UUCB since November. As soon as it is stocked, items are used. Donations of non-perishable items and hygiene items are greatly appreciated. They can be placed directly in the box or if overflowing, stored on the bottom shelf in the kitchen. Please NO cans or glass during these frigid temps.

Leadership of Southern Door Community Land Trust (SDCLT) has had some health concerns, which has slowed our collaboration. Look for further details in the coming months.
